One of the best fish stores along the Wasatch Front is The Aquarium, located at 9316 South on 700 East, behind McDonalds. This store opened shortly after the WMAS was formed, in 1995, but changed ownership after about one year and has grown ever since. With Brad Daniels at the helm (Brad's father is the owner), many positive changes have taken place.

The jewel of The Aquarium is a very large reef tank with some nice, large hard and soft coral and beautiful fish. David Hurst, a WMAS member, helped set up the tank which has a Reverse Daylight Refugia / Sump. The reef wraps around a center column which serves the Sump. Large caverns and arches give a realistic look to this healthy tank. It is a fascinating aquarium which immediately catches your attention as you walk in the door.

Brad Daniels has accepted the invitation to speak to the WMAS at this months meeting. He will tell about his store and may introduce the club to a few good products. He will also tell his experiences with water testing and which tests work for him.

GARF Seminar October 21st and 22nd

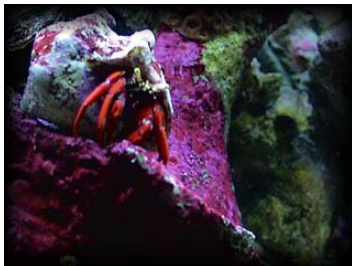

The following is a draft of the proclamation to be submitted to the governor for Coral Reef Awareness Week for the week of the Reef

Tour:

Whereas, the ocean's coral reefs are amazing environments and important ecological systems of our planet earth, and **Whereas**, the future of coral reefs along with the future of our entire world rests in the hands of all people, and **Whereas**, collection of wild marine animals is becoming increasingly less necessary, and **Whereas**, increasing numbers of tropical reef coral and fish are bred and raised commercially and also propagated by citizens of Utah, and **Whereas**, awareness of home grown coral reefs in Utah can be heightened by viewing them in local coral reef aquariums.
